1. Description
Setting: A Village in Texas
Appearance: She-Who-Is-Alone is a small Native American child. She has long, dark hair.
Personality: The main character is shy and lonely at first, but she shows her bravery at the end.

2. Insights
Thoughts: She-Who-Is-Alone's most important thought was to choose her doll to sacrifice.
Feelings: She-Who-Is-Alone must have felt very proud of herself for saving the village.

3. Development
Problem: The problem at the beginning of the story was that the village was in a drought.
Goal: The main character wants the village to finally get some rain.
Outcome: The people of her village appreciated what she did, so she was no longer alone.

4. Statements and Actions
Statements: "You are my most valued possession. It is you the Great Spirits want."
Actions: Her most important action was to sacrifice her doll to save the village.
Interactions: She helps save the village while other members of the tribe do not sacrifice.

5. My Impressions
Like: I like this character because she was brave enough to save the village.
Dislike: I didn't like the way this character did not talk much during the story.
Personal connection: This character reminded me of the time I gave my sister my favorite toy.
