# **EXTENSION LESSON IDEAS**

# For A Deer in the Woods by Laura Ingalls Wilder

## **Food or Cooking Center**

## Resources

#### For butter:

- Jar with lid
- Whipping cream
- Bread or crackers

## For easy applesauce pies:

- Individual graham cracker crusts (1 per child)
- Cinnamon, applesauce, and whipped cream
- Bowl and spoon

# For picnic:

- Bread, butter, cheese, eggs, and cookies
- Brown paper

#### For tea:

- Hot milk and hot water
- Sugar and dash of tea
- Cups and spoons (1 per child)

- 1. **Make butter.** Add room-temperature whipping cream to the jar and shake, shake! When butter forms, rinse it well and eat on bread or crackers. See <u>Churning Butter</u> (<a href="http://www.laurasprairiehouse.com/crafts/churnbutter.html">http://www.laurasprairiehouse.com/crafts/churnbutter.html</a>) for more detailed instructions.
- 2. **Make easy applesauce pies.** Mix applesauce with cinnamon, spoon into crusts, top with whipped cream.
- 3. **Have a Laura-style picnic!** Put butter on bread, add cheese, then wrap each sandwich carefully in brown paper. Hard boil eggs. Wrap cookies in brown paper. Take a blanket with you and enjoy a picnic.
- 4. **Make Laura-style tea.** In a teacup, combine milk and water in equal portions. Add a dash of tea and sugar to taste.

"Once you begin being naughty, it is easier to go and on and on, and sooner or later something dreadful will happen."
